

#### Pupil Premium Expenditure Report 2017 / 2018

Pupil Premium is government funding allocated to schools based on the number of children who have been eligible for Free School Meals at any point in the last 6 years, service children, adopted children and children who have been looked after in local authority care continuously for more than six months.

"It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility." Source - DofE website

The date for our next review of Pupil Premium spending will be June 2019. We will assess the progress and attainment of these children in relation to their cohort. We will also assess their extra support (such as speech & language and Spiral) and the impact this has had. It should be noted that these things will be monitored and reviewed all year in school, but for this purposes of reporting this will be the above date.

Our success criteria are that PP children are not missing out on opportunities that school can provide such as trips and clubs. Our aim is that the children fit in well with their peer groups and achieve their potential academically.
